LETTER FROM THE DEPUTY DIRECTOR

Dear Colleagues,

On behalf of the Children's Bureau and the National Quality Improvement Center for Collaborative Community Court Teams (QIC-CCCT), we welcome you to the 2nd Annual All-Sites Meeting. It's hard to believe it has been a year since we last convened. With the Collaborative Community Court Teams in full implementation mode, this meeting offers a tremendous opportunity to learn about successful innovations from your colleagues and share your experience in addressing implementation challenges. This past year, the QIC-CCCT Technical Assistance Team challenged you to move beyond business as usual and improve practices, polices and systems to address the needs of infants and families affected by prenatal substance exposure and substance use disorders. You are answering that challenge through expanded partnerships, improved coordination and collaboration, new or enhanced services, and data-driven decision making. We developed the agenda to showcase your accomplishments and to support peer to peer networking, discussion and learning, as well as offering subject matter expertise. We encourage you to network with other court teams throughout the meeting.

The Children's Bureau has refocused the mission of the child welfare system to prevent maltreatment and unnecessary placement. To quote Associate Commissioner for the Children's Bureau Jerry Milner,

We need to create environments where families get the support they need before harm occurs.

I believe the QIC-CCCT can make a substantial contribution in realizing that mission. Almost all of the QIC demonstration sites are implementing collaborative practices to support pregnant women, and over half of the sites are implementing prenatal Plans of Safe Care that includes families not involved in the child welfare system. For court involved families, Plans of Safe Care that address the needs of infants and their families by forging coordinated and effective care among infant and maternal health care, substance use disorder treatment, child welfare, early intervention, public health, and other community providers can help prevent the unnecessary removal of children from their homes and the recurrence of child maltreatment. This meeting brings together your partners who are committed to improving outcomes for children and families. We hope your participation helps you achieve your team's mission and goals.

PURPOSE AND OVERVIEW

The 2019 National Quality Improvement Center for Collaborative Community Court Teams (QIC-CCCT) All-Sites Meeting will bring together the 15 QIC-CCCT Demonstration Sites, Subject Matter Experts, and QIC-CCCT Change Teams and staff for a two-day training. This will be an opportunity for Demonstration Sites to share progress, challenges and lessons, engage in peer-to-peer networking and information sharing, and receive expert and targeted Training, Technical Assistance and Coaching (TTAC) from QIC-CCCT Change Teams and Subject Matter Experts. The All-Sites meeting will support demonstration sites in achieving the QIC-CCCT goals:

IMPLEMENTATION

Enhance the capacity of CCCTs to appropriately implement the provisions of the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) amendments to the Child Abuse and Prevention Treatment Act (CAPTA)

CAPACITY

Enhance and expand CCCTs' capacity to effectively collaborate to address the needs of infants, young children, and their families/caregivers affected by substance use disorders (SUDs) and prenatal substance exposure

SUSTAINABILITY

Sustain the effective collaborative partnerships, processes, programs, and procedures implemented to achieve the goals of each demonstration site

DISSEMINATION

Provide the field with lessons they can apply about effective practices for implementing the requirements of CARA and meeting the needs of children and families affected by substance use disorders

Judge Leonard Edwards is a retired judge now serving as a consultant and educator. Judge Edwards was a Superior Court judge for 26 years, retiring in 2006. He served as Judge-In-Residence with the California Judicial Council for 6 years. Judge Edwards is a judicial educator having given over 500 invited presentations in 47 states and 13 foreign countries. He is a past president of the NCJFCJ. In Santa Clara County he founded the Child Advocate Program, the Domestic Violence Council, Kids in Common, and the Dependency Drug Treatment Court. 
Sally Borden, M.Ed.


